www.more to report this time! So much excitement in Hayes Valley, and more to follow. Our focus on the arts continues. Our beloved Temple, by

artist David Best, and supported by Burning Man and fees from new developments, administered through SF Arts Commission, will be de-installed by mid-June. Stay tuned from our ACE committee for further updates regarding what's next. We're now beginning art activities and installations at the Hayes Valley Art Works, at Fell/Laguna, as a temporary activation of the site that will later become affordable family housing. The May 21st "Clay Throwdown" was a great event! And we're continuing to look for mural sites on private property for local emerging artists.

Greening in our neighborhood is expanding. We're working on several Living Alley projects, supported by designated fees from new developments in Hayes Valley, thanks to the Market/ Octavia Plan. New tree plantings are also soon to happen, and Friends of the Urban Forest is using the temporary site at Fell and Laguna as a staging site for trees to be planted soon. Stop by and take a look. Big news about the San Francisco Unified School District (SFSUD) announced its intention to finally create the Arts Center for our kids in our public schools, located at the historic site at 135 Van Ness and 190 Fell Stree between Hayes and Fell. It's a city block that will be devoted to public education through the arts, and right in the heart of HVNA boundaries. School of the Arts High School will be moved here, closer to all the performing arts centers, and the newly opened MOMA. Much more to follow on this important new arts education center.

Property Crimes Update in Hayes Valley

Property crimes are major problem in San Francisco, especially in Northern Police District. At the May 2, 2016 Public Safety Meeting updates were given by several city agencies about what they are doing to fight the crimes. Property crimes, as defined by the San Francisco Police Department, are Burglary, Auto Theft, Theft from Vehicle (car break-ins), Arson and Other Theft. 2015 was an especially bad year for property crimes in Northern Station. But there is some good news on the way.

At the meeting were officers from Northern Station showing that property crimes in their district were down 16% in February, 2016 over February, 2015. Car break-ins were down 29%. The latest statistics were just released and show a drop of 17% in property crimes of April, 2016 over March, 2016. Car break-ins were down 14%.

Also at the meeting was the new Neighborhood Prosecutor assigned to Northern, Assistant District Attorney, Erica Corns. She brought along the special Assistant District Attorney, Shirin Oloumi. She is assigned to overseeing the prosecution of auto burglaries and thefts. They talked about the steps the DA's Office has taken over the last year. Every auto burglary is brought to Shirin Oloumi. She prosecutes herself certain problem defendants. There has been an increased amount of jail time for repeat offenders. There is a lot of pressure on the DA's Office to stop the repeat of property crimes.

This is good news that the police are showing a decrease in crime and the District Attorney's Office is making special efforts to prosecute the crimes. But more is needed. Prevention is especially important. We have talked for years about not leaving anything in your car. Even during the day. There is a call for special Ambassadors to be located at certain hot spots for property crimes. They will assist the residents and especially the tourists in protecting their property. Once again all property crimes must be reported for the police to allocate the resources to the toughest spots.

The reduction in the number of property crimes will be a difficult task to accomplish. Many city agencies will need to be involved along with alert residents. Things have gotten better but there is a long ways to go.

Upcoming Plans for Page Street

We are excited about new ideas to make Page Street safer and more comfortable for cycling or double with the set of the s comfortable for cycling and walking. These new ideas, including possibly converting Page Street to a one-way street westbound from Octavia to Buchanan, would make Page into the street it is supposed to be - a quiet and calm neighborhood street - and not the freeway ramp that it has become.

HVNA has long advocated that Page Street should be converted into a "bicycle boulevard," with slower car speeds, reduced car volumes, and safer, more welcoming routes for bicyclists. While the new green center-running bike lane between Laguna and Octavia is a decent start, it is really a band-aide for a street. There are still too many cars on Page. Although no decision has yet to be made, we're very enthusiastic about getting freeway traffic off of Page and encourage further consideration of the westbound one-way option. This option would include a wide, comfortable "contra-flow" bike lane (such as the one on Polk near Market- only better!) that could be fully-separated from traffic by tree-plantings or reorganized curbside parking.

Moving forward, we also urge SFMTA, using technology and computers, to "meter" car traffic on Oak Street between Stanyan/Kezar and Octavia. From the west, drivers, mostly single-occupant, cumulatively overwhelm Oak and Octavia leading to cars spilling over to Page and Haight Streets. The city needs to meter that traffic upstream before it jams up like a clogged sewer, and at the same time, use well-tested traffic calming to keep the cars from spilling over to Page and Haight. Car-drivers can have a bettermanaged Oak and bus-riders will have a better Haight. Bicyclists and pedestrians need space too, and the logical street in this corridor is Page.

Policy Towards Private Transit

he Transportation & Planning Committee of Hayes Valley Neighborhood Association continues to follow developments regarding the private commuter buses running between the city and Silicon Valley. We applaud the SFMTA's policy changes that require the private buses to use designated arterial streets like Oak and Fell. Those streets are where the buses are most suitable - not on streets like Haight or Hayes, where they impede Muni. The private buses are heavier than what is normally permitted on most streets, and contribute to wear and tear on streets designed for lighter vehicles.

We are aware that SFMTA has designated new loading zones for private buses on Oak and Fell. For the past few years this has been our suggestion. We'd rather see SFMTA and tech workers adequately fund PUBLIC transit but in the meantime this is an acceptable compromise. These loading zones are on the main arterials rather than neighborhood streets, and significantly, unlike the use of bus stops, it is already legal for the city to create these loading zones.

Regarding the use of Muni stops, once again this year HVNA joined with citywide allies in opposing a misguided State Assembly bill that would have allowed private buses to use Muni stops. Muni has enough problems with all the car traffic and double parking in the area. Private buses should work out routes that do not impede PUBLIC transit - like sticking to Oak and Fell.

As we've said before, we appreciate the products that the employees of these corporations design - from cancer-fighting drugs at Genentech to search engines at Google. Indeed some of our members work for these companies. But private, exclusive buses in public bus stops have negative impacts on public transit. They prevent Muni from pulling up to the curb to pick up senior citizens and people with disabilities, and they add to the travel times of thousands of Muni passengers. We need to build up our public transit infrastructure, expand cycling options, and discourage further privatization of our public realms.

New Quarters: Inaugural Exhibition

T Tayes Valley Art Works is pleased to announce the inaugural exhibi-H tion New Quarters, opening on Saturday, June 4 with a reception for the artists from 4-6pm. New Quarters includes artworks by Violette Alby, Michelle Echenique, Jackie Farkas, Daniel Farnan, John Farnsworth, Eliza Fernand, Steven Garen, Jamie Kelty, Nicole Lavelle, Cara Levine, Sonja Ljubinkovic, Pablo Manga, Jary Neibur, Jay Rosenberg, Suchitra Sharma, Vidhu Singh, Emma Spertus, Robert Spertus, and Deirdre Weinberg. The exhibition was juried and curated by Tanya Gayer. New Quarters will be on view from June 4 – July 9, 2016.


The selected artworks for New Quarters interpret the hybrid site of Hayes Valley Art Works through installations, photography, painting, and collage. Functioning simultaneously as developed and feral, HVAW provides a multifarious encounter with the land, art, people, and the built environment. A shipping container on site functions as a gallery for such artworks as the the still and serene abstract paintings by Jary Niebur and the complex collages by Jamie Kelty. Each artwork featured in the gallery utilizes color and form in similar qualities as their surroundings of telephone poles, concrete slabs, fencing, overgrown milk thistle, freshly planted gardens, and modest grade of dirt terrain. The combination of these artworks and elements located in the site recall a history of a developed property that once functioned as a freeway onramp and homeless encampment, but other elements of the property reveal an attempt by nature to recapture what the lot once was prior to its development. The artworks selected for this exhibition reflect the brackish environment that one experiences upon entering HVAW, and question what this rare slice of open and underdeveloped space in San Francisco might provide for the arts community.

The outdoor installations of New Quarters additionally call upon the hybridity of the environment seen in the work of Michelle Echenique and Steven Garen who focus on direct individual contact with nature and human-made materials like metal or concrete. Using such human-nature combinations, the artists respond to a part of the HVAW site that subsequently becomes a personal and private space in a vast and open area. It is this individual and community aspect of each installation, and interest in infrastructure and nature, that supports the HVAW intentions as a site for artists and the public. As the organization looks forward in future programming and workshops it endeavors to function as a place of refuge and dialog amongst the shifting Bay Area communities, housing, and economy.

Maps will be available in the gallery for viewers to locate and enjoy the outdoor installations. Hayes Valley Artworks is located at 456 Laguna Street, San Francisco, CA 94102. It is open six days a week from 12 - 5pm (closed on Tuesdays). It is supported through a partnership between Hayes Valley Neighborhood Association, City of San Francisco, Haight Street Art Center, community support, and volunteers

- Collect and keep all corresponding paperwork, including lease agreement, release of liability, and garden rules
- Maintain a list of current gardeners

· Communicate with lease holders of inactive or unsightly plots, eventually evicting from plots if unresponsive to less extreme attempts to correct.

Hours of operation are currently set to be 7:00a - 7:00p (or sunset, whichever time is earlier). Smoking, littering, loitering, skateboarding, feeding birds, and other activities as described in agreement, are not allowed


