ayes Valley Art Works is excited to present its second open call exhibition, Present Ground. This group exhibition features site-specific installations and artworks that respond, engage and react to the Hayes Valley Art Works site. The site is the largest, mainly outdoor, and undeveloped art space in San Francisco. Designated as a "community creation space," Hayes Valley Art Works is a place to come together to discuss, learn, teach, share and express artistic vision for the betterment of the neighborhood.

The physical site of Hayes Valley Art Works has had multiple histories and roles. With the removal of the central freeway in the late 1990s and remodel of Octavia Boulevard, the site was left uninhabited. It is currently deemed by the city of San Francisco as a temporary art and community space, and will subsequently be rebuilt into a low-income housing in the coming years.

Constantly evolving, the narrative of the site continues. If this ground could speak, what would it say? Would it be wounded? Rejuvenated? Each artist featured in Present Ground calls attention to the unending, evolving nature and impact of the physical site as it moves into the future. This exhibition serves as a recognition of the repurposing of space that has created multiple stories, histories and narratives left imprinted in the dirt.

and as the vast number of issues and candidates come before us during this coming election, I'm reminded of our shared heritage as Americans and residents of our Hayes Valley neighborhood. We come from diverse memories of poverty and privilege, enslavement and freedom, persecution and acceptance. We have inherited a country founded by a small group of individuals with great intellectual capacity who created a combined vision for the future nation.

We are now in a time of significant social change, and here in Hayes Valley, we reflect most of the upheaval that taking place in metropolitan areas. It is again a time of the Spoken Word, this time via social media instead of Ben Franklin's printing press. While our country's founders used their oratory skills and distributed written pamphlets to reach the voters, they eventually reached consensus for a new way of governance. Today, during this time of dissonance, reaching compromise on governance issues seems difficult.

In the coming election, we will review the long list of ballot measures. HVNA is a 501C-4 non profit organization, which allows the organization to take positions on important issues before our voters. Please attend our community and membership meeting on Thursday, October 27, at 7 pm to hear about some of the issues before you.

One important point about our democracy: eventually, we voters, who remain diverse in politics and lifestyle, must discuss important issues with one another in peaceful and respectful ways, instead of video sound bites and written tweets, and agree to accept the rule of law that will govern us all. And, as we decide on the path forward during this time of great change, consider, as our nation's, city's, and neighborhood's founders also struggled to do, how we will achieve a future for the greater good of all.

A rtists Jeremy Fish and Stanley Mouse have donated their art to "the canvas project." We'll be showing their artwork and 8 additional artists' artwork painted on "canvases" that are , in truth, discarded tablecloths destined for landfill.



SFSU Department chair Dr. Connie Ulasewizc and SFSU instructor and textile specialist Gail Baugh, collaborated with the SF Hotel Council, to collect over 1500 discarded tablecloths to be used as shopping bags and clothing. Local apparel industry trade association PEOPLEWEARSF has provided expertise in sewing manufacturing to provide new opportunities for producing products made from existing textiles like discarded tablecloths. This new "canvas project" provides new value to these tablecloths as works of art.

New Executive Director at Mo Magic

For over 10 years Sheryl Davis, an HVNA Board Member, has been the Executive Director of Mo Magic, Mo Magic and Collective Impact and Magic Zone are part of the 25 group collaboration of youth programs serving youth in the Western Addition and Hayes Valley. Sheryl has led this collaboration into becoming one of the most successful programs serving youth in the city. Over 700 youth participate in after school programs. During the summer 900-1200 youth have programs to go to that are a part of Mo Magic. This is highlighted at the end of the summer break with the Backpack Giveaway where this year almost 1500 backpacks were given to the youth in our area. HVNA has many of its members volunteer with Mo Magic and HVNA also provides financial support for the summer programs.



Appointed by Mayor Ed Lee Sheryl Davis is moving on to another position to help the people of San Francisco. Many people were there on Thursday, September 8 when Sheryl was sworn in by Mayor Lee as the new Executive Director of the Human Rights Commission of San Francisco. We thank Sheryl for her many years of service to the youth of our area and know she will do well at her new position.

The new executive Director of Mo Magic, starting September 26, is Kimiah Tucker. Born and raised in San Francisco Kimiah has been working for the last 4 years with Collective Impact at the Ella Hill Hutch Community Center. The mother of two children Kimiah has a Masters Degree in social work from San Jose State. The Mo Magic program originated in the Public Defender's Office and the Executive Director is an employee of that department. Interviewed and hired by Public Defender Jeff Adachi, Kimiah is already working hard to continue the great tradition of Mo Magic.

Kimiah Tucker has the experience to lead Mo Magic. For the last few years she has been the Transitional Age Youth Workforce Director. They find jobs and place young adults ages 18-24 in those positions. Often overlooked by Federal, State and City budgets the TAY programs are now being recognized as one of the best ways to fight some of the problems in our area. Kimiah has our support as she leads Mo Magic into its next decade.

Te proudly announce a season of LOVE, SATIRE AND BETRAYAL for our 21st season under the artistic leadership of acclaimed Bay Area actor and director L. Peter Callender. The season opens in October with Romeo & Juleit directed by Sherri Young and L. Peter Callender. Friday, October 14 // The Fits // Directed by Anna Rose Holmer, 2016 (pictured left).

Toni is a young tomboy in a black Cincinnati neighborhood who trains as a boxer with her brother at a local community center. She becomes fascinated with an elite after-school dance team that also practices there. Enamored with their strength and confidence, Toni joins the dance group — eagerly learning routines, mastering drills, and even piercing her ears to fit in. When a mysterious outbreak of fainting and swooning spells, they call "the fits", are embraced by the team as a peculiar rite of passage, Toni must decide how far she will go to fit in.

Friday, October 21 // Tickled // Directed by David Farrier and Dylan Reeve, 2016 (pictured right).

After stumbling upon a mysterious tickling competition video online, journalist David Farrier reaches out to request an interview for a light, puff piece for New Zealand TV. But the response he receives is not what he expected — he is answered with virulent insults about his sexual orientation and threats of extreme legal action should he dig any deeper. Shocked but intrigued, David ignores these threats and starts investigating — a journey that takes him around the world, and leads him to uncover a bizarre and vast empire of harassment and abuse. The further he goes, the stranger, darker, and outlandishly-entertaining this detective story becomes. "Tickled" is a wild and fascinating ride through a secret wormhole into a hidden world of wealth, power, and anonymity.

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
