Hayes Valley Welcomes New Board

At its annual election meeting, Hayes Valley Neighborhood Association elected a new Board of Directors for the coming year. Headed by Paul Olsen, who served as the group's Treasurer the past three years, the Board is a very diverse group. Former President Richard Johnson was elected Vice President; a move that Olsen says will allow him to build on Johnson's connection with many neighborhood groups. Olsen likens Johnson's role this year as being his ambassador.

Olsen, the retired CEO of Under One Roof in the Castro, is interested in being able to use his non-profit and organizational expertise in furthering the goals of the neighborhood association and expanding the outreach efforts of the group. With the building of Octavia Blvd nearing completion, the development of the parcels lining the boulevard is an issue the residents are focusing on. With much of the Hayes Valley area included in the Market/Octavia Better Neighborhoods Plan, working with the City to finalize that plan is a priority for the group. Founding President Patricia Walkup remains on the Board, and is Co-chair of the Transportation and Planning committee, which will deal with these issues as well as possible development at the UC Extension site.

The disruption caused by the boulevard has created some quality of life issues for surrounding neighbors and this is something that Olsen also feels needs addressing. And while Hayes Valley has become a very desirable place to live and work, the organization's efforts in Public Safety and Beautification will also be emphasized this year. In fact, with help from Board member and Beautification committee Chair Jim Warshell, the

neighborhood is joining in efforts to improve Hayes Valley Playground in March, and an overall cleanup in District 5 in April.

Olsen, who also has a degree in Social Ecology, states he is very impressed with the makeup of the Hayes Valley Neighborhood Association Board of Directors. "They are a wonderful group of men and women who truly are interested in making a difference in this very special place," Olsen says. "The collective expertise is amazing. This Board's commitment to making Hayes Valley an even better neighborhood will have a far-reaching impact." Noting his studies focused on the impact of people on their environment, including other people, Olsen is very pleased with the makeup of the Board. "In urban settings, it's people who have the biggest impact on other people's environments," he stated. "Having this amazing group of people volunteer to lead this association guarantees a more positive impact for Hayes Valley."

Worldware features custom-crafted furniture, exotic lighting, opulent bedding, one-of-a-kind accessories, and exquisite gift items from around the world. Owner and interior designer Greg Henson is helping organize the Hayes Valley merchants' participation in the upcoming World Environment Day on our future Hayes Green. He is also about to embark on a new show for HGTV, *Small Spaces – Big Style*.

Briefly describe how you became the owner of Worldware?

I was in NYC doing theater and fell in love with my partner, Jeff Brooks, who lived at Laguna and Hayes, moved here with him and purchased Worldware, both the trademark and the store.

Since you bought the business, what parts basically stayed intact and what is different?

The previous owner was doing eco-friendly home furnishings and hemp clothing. We stayed true to ecological philosophy and still use vendors that reforest trees. However, the store was sort of "shabby chic," so we took it to another level and evolved it to "urban ultra chic." The dressing room is now the office with a bar for our clients. We really value customer service and send out handwritten letters to all of our clients. Also, Rison and Carmel, our dogs, are here with us everyday.

Where do you go to find your merchandise?

We have merchandise from 68 different countries. We travel, and now people are coming straight off the plane from other countries to us with unique merchandise. We also go to trade fairs in NYC, Vegas and Paris.

How are you involved in the upcoming World Environment Day?

As the Co-president of the Hayes Valley Merchants Association, I am working with SF parks, HVNA and our local merchants to showcase the Hayes Valley district and the Octavia Boulevard Project. We are getting planters to line the streets with plants that are indigenous to California. Local school children will talk to our visitors about each plant. We want all the shops and

restaurants to spruce up their windows to encompass the "Flower Power" theme.

I know you and Jeff do some amazing work for our community; can you share some examples?

Both Jeff and I are HIV+ and we feel motivated to support the community we are a part of. We have done things for Project Inform and other local AIDS organizations. Jeff is training to do the Aids LifeCycle Ride and I will be part of the road crew. So far he has raised over \$12,000, but his goal is \$20,000. Our neighbors in Hayes Valley are very supportive of our work.

Do you have a favorite activity in the neighborhood?

I never grow tired of strolling down the street looking at the ever-changing window displays. In that respect Hayes Valley is San Francisco's perfect chameleon.

Any insider's tips you care to share?

Café Corbas for lunch. It is just good food and you feel like Nadi is your Dad whipping you up the perfect sandwich with just the right amount of mayo and mustard. He knows exactly how you like it.

I'm from Texas, so I was excited to discover this wonderful new restaurant on Gough Street, **Sauce**. It is gourmet comfort food without the gourmet prices. Everything was excellent, and I highly recommend the deep fried peanut butter and jelly sandwich with ice cream.

Meetings Planned to Discuss Development Proposals for UC Extension Site

Beginning in April, HVNA's Transportation and Planning Committee will be sponsoring a series of community meetings to discuss the pros and cons of the various proposals that have been suggested for the re-use of the UC Extension site. We hope that open discussions of the issues will enable us to reach consensus on what we consider to be the best uses for the site. Representatives from the Planning Department's Better Neighborhoods team have agreed to participate in the meetings to help answer questions, discuss the Planning Dept's development guidelines for the site, and let us know how we can participate in the approval process.

Some of the issues we will be discussing are:

- Preservation of existing buildings
- Zoning: The pros and cons of "public" versus "mixed use" zoning.
- Possible uses for the site if the zoning remains "public."
- If "mixed use" zoning is preferred, how would we want to balance housing density with retail space, open space, public space and neighborhood services?
- What are the advantages and disadvantages of increasing housing density?
- Do we want an organized, indoor recreation "program" that would serve people of all ages and include a gymnasium, or do we simply want a "community space" consisting of meeting rooms available to be rented by community groups?
- Do we want 80 to 88 percent of the housing on the site to be market rate rental housing that would be unaffordable for most middle and lower income San Francisco residents, or would the neighborhood benefit more if housing opportunities for a more diverse mix of income levels were provided?
- Would the community be in favor of identifying organizations interested in subsidizing some of the housing, such as arts groups (including employees/musicians from the performing arts

center, students and teachers from the art schools, the new music school and the ballet school)? Would our community like to investigate the possibility that San Francisco's teachers might be interested in providing some subsidized housing on the UC site?

Representatives from the Better Neighborhoods team will be there to help answer questions

- Parking policies: Residents who favor providing a large number of off-street parking spaces as well as those who would like to see greatly reduced off-street parking have two common goals: 1) Neither group wants an increase in traffic congestion, and 2) neither group wants to increase competition for on-street parking. We will discuss new policies that could be developed that would provide solutions to both of these problems.

All residents are encouraged to participate in these meetings. Our committee will be notifying all HVNA members of the dates of these meetings and will also post the information on our website at www.hayesvalleysf.org. We strongly encourage those interested in transportation and planning issues to join the T&P Committee. Because the committee is involved in a wide variety of issues we may have several meetings each month, with each meeting focused on a different issue. We have a great deal of work ahead and need additional committee members to work with us. 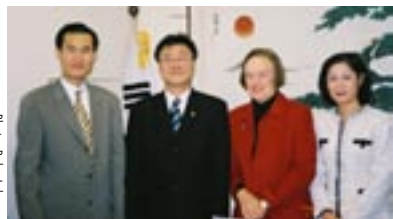
