President's Column

Decisions have been postponed, meetings restructured, burdens shared as a result of neighbors coming together in time of need. Sidewalks swept, mail picked up, plants watered. Not big things, but unattainable under the circumstances were it not for caring members of the community. Little things can seem insurmountable when they all pile up at difficult times. Having those

At our October meeting, that sense of community was demonstrated in a different way. After many meetings with neighbors, committee members and the Planning Dept, Age Song Senior Communities asked for, and received, the endorsement of the membership for its proposed third senior care facility at Hayes and Laguna. Much of the discussion centered around what good neighbors Age Song/Hayes Valley Care have been in the ten years they've been in the neighborhood, and as they have gone through the process of building their second facility and planning their third.

Also at that meeting, the developers of the UC Extension site gave a lengthy presentation of their revised proposal, citing the feedback received from the neighborhood at the series of meetings sponsored by the Transportation and Planning committee for several of the changes. After the presentation there was lengthy and lively feedback from a community that cares not only about the present, but also the future. My take on the feedback was that while the project is seen as better than that first presented to the community, there are grave concerns remaining that UC and the developers must take into account if they expect community support. We will be following up on this and keeping everyone advised on our plans and timeline for action.

In closing, thank you all for being part of a caring community. Whether your actions help an immediate neighbor, someone down the block, or even someone who may not move to this area for some time, they are appreciated and necessary for this neighborhood to be at its best.

In case I don't have the chance to do so in person, let me wish you happy holidays now.

Parks Connect: A Partnership to Revitalize San Francisco Mini-Parks

What is Parks Connect?

Parks Connect is an exciting collaboration between the Mayor's Office and community groups, designed to revitalize small parks throughout the city.

Sounds great, but what does Parks Connect mean for Hayes Valley?

Parks Connect is starting in Hayes Valley, at Koshland Park. There will be a community work-day on December 3rd from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Friends, neighbors and business owners will work together to revitalize the park, from flowerbeds to jungle gym.

This "park-makeover" will help bring Koshland up to excellent maintenance standards. It will facilitate a smooth transition to the City-Community partnership and implementation of a formal work plan.

As the pilot site for Parks Connect, Koshland can set a strong example for other parks throughout the city, demonstrating the power and importance of community participation to create beautiful public spaces.

What are the long-term benefits of Parks Connect?

Under the Parks Connect initiative, volunteer stewards will partner with employees from the Rec. and Parks Department to create work plans and implement high standards of park maintenance and care.

At the city level, this partnership will addresses the problem of the city's resources being stretched too thinly to do an adequate job at most parks.

District 5 Neighborhood Disaster Plan

■ The Office of Emergency Services and Homeland Security, along with the Mayor's Office on Neighborhood Services and representatives from Supervisorial District 5, are in the process of developing a Neighborhood Disaster Plan that will serve as a template to help neighborhoods within District 5 prepare to achieve a level of self-sufficiency in a disaster. Hayes Valley is one of the zones or neighborhoods in District 5 that this plan will target.

A Plan Specific to Our Neighborhood

The plan strongly encourages local residents to become actively involved in the San Francisco Fire Department's NERT Program (Neighborhood Emergency Response Team) as a cornerstone to a prepared neighborhood. However, this Community Disaster Plan goes beyond the NERT program and establishes guidelines for how the District as a whole can devise a local response to disaster that complements the City and County of San Francisco larger (citywide) Emergency Operations Plan. When individuals and their neighborhoods are prepared to mutually assist each other immediately after a disaster, lives can be saved, property can be spared and emergency services can focus on responding to the most devastated areas.

The plan will address some of the following issues or neighborhood concerns:

- To outline how the neighborhood can organize an Emergency Preparedness Committee
- To identify disaster needs that might be unique to that community and how the neighborhood can work together to address those needs (this will involve identifying key assets in that community facilities, organizations, personnel, etc.)
- To discuss roles that the neighborhood might play in helping the City to meet disaster needs in their community (feeding, sheltering, first aid, damage assessment, support for elderly and disabled persons, etc.)
- To provide information for how local residents can work together to improve their individual preparedness and capacity to shelter safely in place for 72-hours post disaster.

There will be a **series of meetings and workgroups** held to develop the plan. The first meeting was held on Wednesday, November 9 at the Office of Emergency Services, 1011 Turk Street. Representatives from HVNA were among those attending. Future meetings will be announced and added to the HVNA Calendar.

Stop the Morning Tow on Oak!

■ Members will be asked to vote to support the repeal of the tow-away lane on Oak St. The following is information from proponents of the repeal.

For drivers:

- Frees up over 150 long-term parking spaces
- Reduces speeding

For ALL residents:

- Reduces traffic noise
- Makes our sidewalks much safer/more pleasant
- Lots more neighborhood parking for your early morning guests, even if they are just dropping by to pick you up
- Improved localized air quality

Why this change is possible:


- For many months, this same approach has worked very well for Fell Street (parking there is both sides of the street at all times, except street cleaning)
- Traffic volumes on Oak and Fell are similar (currently commuters are "given" 4 lanes on Oak to go to work in the morning, while those same commuters do fine with 3 lanes on Fell in the afternoon)
- Drivers tend to avoid the curbside traffic lane on Oak Street anyway, due to its discomforting tilt toward the sidewalk for drainage pur-
- The City wastes valuable taxpayer resources by deploying Parking Control Officers each weekday morning to ticket/tow vehicles parked curbside on the north side of Oak Street
- Traffic uses the north (curbside) lane for only 90 minutes a day, 5 days/wk
- It is dangerous to facilitate speeding with 4 lanes of morning freewaybound traffic through Oak Street, since the traffic comes to an abrupt crawl just east of Fillmore Street (approaching Octavia Blvd)





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
