es, it is finally happening. An eight-year labor of love is resulting in the Western Addition Peace Wall, installed on the Koshand Park retaining wall over the next two weeks. Here is the story: Since 1999 churches, schools, and community based organizations in the Western Addition have been learning a peace empowerment process, and painting tiles of what PEACE means to each person.

Through the integration of the visual arts, volunteers have taught a program in two local elementary schools, Megan Furth Academy (formerly Sacred Heart Elementary) and John Muir Elementary, and over fifty community based organizations in the Western Addition, that focused on tolerance, understanding, and non-violence. Participants collectively learned ways to develop positive and proactive solutions to resolving conflicts and defusing anger. The project was developed and implemented by residents for residents – a true community endeavor.

A community celebration will follow on Saturday, June 9, 2007. The wall will be dedicated to the families who have lost their children to violence in the Western Addition.

Pre-Kindergarten Enrollment for 2007–8

The John Muir School pre-Kindergarten class has limited openings for the next school year which starts in August. We are part of the Child Development Program of San Francisco Unified School District . We follow the school calendar, have a limit of 16 students and the class is taught by one teacher and an assistant teacher. It is a free half-day program, (in the morning with lunch provided) and we expect families to volunteer at least six hours a month. Since it is Pre-K, the children must turn four before December 2nd. We offer a typical preschool experience, which includes daily visits to Koshland Park, gardening at the community garden, field trips around the City, celebration of various holidays and special events, an emphasis on pre-literacy activities as well as social and emotional and physical development of the child.

Neighborhood Tree Planting – July 21

■ The Friends of the Urban Forest ("FUF") will sponsor a tree planting on July 21, 2007 in the Lower Haight and Hayes Valley neighborhoods. Residents and business owners in the planting area (which is from Duboce St. to Oak St. and from Octavia St. to Scott St.) are invited to plant a tree in front of their houses or businesses. Normally the cost of planting a tree would be over \$300, but the cost through FUF, with the help of neighborhood volunteers, is only \$150 per tree (or \$110 for tree replacing a previously permitted tree). The cost also includes cutting the concrete and obtaining the proper permits.

To participate in this planting, the property owner need only download two forms from the FUF website at: http://www.fuf.net./tree_ plantings/index.html and return them to the Neighborhood Organizer, Ellen Brown, at ellen.brown@lw.com or 395-8289 by June 25, 2007. After submitting these forms, all participants will be invited to an organizational meeting in late June, where they can choose the tree species that they would like to plant at their properties and have any logistical

questions answered by an FUF representative. Also, please contact your Neighborhood Organizer if you would like to help plant trees on July 21st, or can volunteer to spread the word to your neighbors as a "block captain."

The mature trees in the Hayes Valley area are perfect examples of how trees help to reduce air and water pollution, reduce energy costs, beautify the neighborhood, increase property values, block wind, and absorb noise. The goal of this planting is to expand those benefits to the entire planting area.

Art Installation at Patricia's Green

O ver the past few weeks there has been a structure in the center of Patricia's Green in Hayes Valley, and over the past few days lots of activity in the parcel across the street next to the Progress Foundation building. All of this has been leading to the opening of the most recent temporary art installation on the Green, which will be an historic miniature golf course. The structure on the Green is the caddy

shack, and the golf course itself is located right across the way. This art installation is sponsored by the SF Arts Commission.

Rather than castles and windmills and other structures that are usually found in a "pee-wee" golf course, each hole of this installation features a bit of our history. People can come and play, interacting with the art and learning more of our local history as they do so. While one hole may feature a Zen garden, another will showcase an aerial street map of the neighborhood, and the final hole ties everything closer to the neighborhood and the Green by incorporating Patricia Walkup into the installation. Not coincidentally, this hole also features a bulletin board, because some of the vital elements of a successful neighborhood are gathering spaces such as the Green and communication.



Tentative plans call for the Grand Opening to take place on Saturday, May 26th at 12:30pm. After a short ceremony, join your neighbors and friends in interacting with this temporary art installation by Wowhaus. Information is available at Patricia's Green. It is possible that volunteers could help with staffing and allow the golf course to be open more frequently. If you're interested in that possi-

Another exciting element of the installation relating to our history is the showing of the silent movie Greed, which was filmed here in Hayes Valley. That showing is scheduled for September 29th, and plans call for the movie to be projected against the Progress Foundation building, adjacent to the golf course. More information will be available closer to that date.

The community has worked hard to promote art in the neighborhood, and specifically on the Green. Being adjacent to the performing arts center of the city, we are hoping to have future performances on the Green. Market Octavia Plan

fter nearly 8 years of community workshops, meetings and public hearings involving hundreds of residents, one of the most progressive and comprehensive plans in San Francisco's history – the Market & Octavia Better Neighborhoods Plan – will go before the Board of Supervisors this summer, perhaps as early as June.

Covering an area in the heart of the City encompassing Duboce Triangle, Lower Haight, Upper Market, Hayes Valley and the Northern Mission, the plan outlines a vision that builds upon, enhances and complements the area's walkability, diversity and convenient access to transit. It sets strong policies that favor transit users, bicyclists and people on foot, rather than cars. It brings more than 1000 units of affordable housing to the city. New developer fees will pay for \$68 million of public improvements. The protections for historic preservation and against residential demolitions are the strongest of any plan in the city.

The usual NIMBY forces that oppose affordable housing and reduced parking have attacked the plan, but progressives, including Livable City and the San Francisco Bicycle Coalition, embrace the plan. To be sure, some progressives support the plan's overall vision but are concerned about gentrification.

There is indeed a well-founded concern over gentrification and displacement. But the Market & Octavia Plan is a sound and workable start at maintaining diversity and providing housing opportunities for all San Franciscans. Half of the former Central Freeway parcels are designated for affordable housing – including dedicated accommodation for the formerly homeless and others with special needs.

Importantly, the plan caps the amount of parking that developers can provide. Parking increases the cost of a unit by 20 percent, and reduces the number of units that can be built on a parcel by another 20 percent. Less parking is an effective way to provide affordable housing, support the city's Transit First policy, and avoid creating more congestion on city streets.

What's more, the plan expressly prohibits residential demolitions unless they produce more housing, and do not diminish affordability or the number of rent-controlled units. There are further protections for historic resources, including Landmarks Board scrutiny and mandatory discretionary reviews by the Planning Commission.

Some people find fault with the proposed towers at Van Ness and Market. But these towers would ensure that the plan brings as much housing as possible to San Francisco – and in precisely the right place to capitalize on the city's transit investments. The proposals for "superinclusionary" on-site housing requirements there will provide even more affordable as well as workforce housing.

But the key to avoiding a surfeit of luxury condos is lower parking caps – 0.25 spaces per unit. Less parking would orient the housing towards the city, rather than catering to commuters using Highway 101.

Towers are not necessarily the province of the wealthy. Other cities have shown, with the right community benefits and design, towers can be family and working-class friendly. Housing with active ground floor uses and street enhancements will enliven what is now a forlorn, desolate and foreboding place.

Every week that we delay passing the plan, more developers come forward with proposals. Development will happen, with or without a plan. But the Market & Octavia Plan makes sure that that development happens according to the vision of the community. It protects historic resources, affordability and diversity. And each new unit will generate upwards of \$10,000 in developer-funded community improvements, including parks, childcare, traffic calming and greener streets.

The plan passed the Planning Commission on April 5, with a 5–2 vote. The two dissenters – Christina Olague and Kathrin Moore – actually voted for an even stronger, more progressive version of the plan with less parking. San Francisco's progressive community needs to unite and ensure that an even stronger plan gets swiftly adopted at the Board of Supervisors. In the next month the Transportation and Planning committee of HVNA will work diligently to get this innovative plan passed undiluted. Too few evacuation buses too late, too little information about what was happening, and forced abandonment of pets and personal resources were just some of the hardships facing the citizens of Pripyat. Similar were circumstances during Hurricane Katrina, some twenty years later. Victims and survivors of both events continue to face health, home and other challenges years after the event and should be kept in our thoughts.

The April meeting was also our Annual Block Captain review, and two neighborhood NERTs were acknowledged for their outstanding efforts over the past year. Kathy Ober, now the new Co-Coordinator for adjacent Duboce Park group, was awarded the Certificate of Excellence for her steadfast guidance and support of outreach and education over the past year. NERT John Lowell was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for accomplishing all of the requested tasks in his area as a Block Captain. Both awards were signed by Chief Hayes-White and our hero, Lt. Arteseros, Kathy Ober and John Lowell for all your hard work and for giving us all an example to follow!



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UC Extension Update

There has been quite a bit happening regarding the proposed development of the UC Berkeley Extension site at 55 Laguna. Most recently, the Landmarks Advisory Planning Board voted to landmark the campus. The Planning Commission will review their recommendation on May 24th. There has been some dispute over what the impact of a landmark designation will have on adaptive re-use of the site and whether the community is supportive of such a designation. HVNA is on record as favoring the listing of the campus on the National Register of Historic Places, and favoring adaptive re-use of the site, but has not taken a position on a local Landmark designation. We urge you to make your feelings heard in writing or in person at the Planning Commission hearing, scheduled for 1:30pm on Thursday, May 24th, in Room 400, City Hall.

The Commission held a hearing on April 19th regarding the draft EIR for the proposed development. This allowed people to testify on the environmental impacts of the project, not the merits of the project. Public testimony was heard and written comments were accepted by the Planning Department. The Department will now review and respond within two to four months. Then the Commission will act to certify the EIR.

The proposed development at 55 Laguna has gone through several changes since it was first proposed. The neighborhood and others have been very vocal in pointing out shortcomings and in debating the merits of this, or any, development. HVNA is on record as opposing the developer's proposal as of July 2006, and urging the Planning Department to work with an open community process, rather than reacting to the developer's proposals, in revising the plan, in particular regarding historic preservation, public use zoning, open space, adequate recreation and community space, housing for LGBT seniors and/or people living with AIDS, parking ratios and more.

After many meetings and discussions, the Planning Department has indicated they will hire an unbiased firm to conduct a survey of what community benefits are needed in the area, both currently and in the future. This study would be administered by the Department, although partial funding is likely to come from the developer. We will continue working with the Department and Supervisor Mirkarimi's office to ensure any survey is conducted in a neutral manner and that the community is aware and involved. While different people may have different views, if everyone is able to participate in an open and honest process, we can all feel comfortable with the result.

The Planning Department has also taken the position that Waller Street is still owned by the City. The developer and UC contest this position, and each side has hired experts to advocate its position. This issue will have an impact on whatever happens on the site.
