Market & Octavia Plan is Official

fter eight years of workshops, meetings and public hearings, the Market & Octavia Better Neighborhoods Plan was finally adopted by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in April. Join the Hayes Valley Neighborhood Association and other community groups in a celebration on Friday May 30th (6-9 pm) at the Rickshaw Stop at 155 Fell Street. The venue is family friendly, so bring the kids, too! HVNA and DTNA are underwriting limited drinks and refreshments, so there is no reason not to come.

HVNA thanks the Board of Supervisors, and especially Supervisor Ross Mirkarimi, for ensuring that the plan reflects our neighborhood's spirit of diversity, affordability, and smart growth. We also extend thanks to the San Francisco Planning Department staff, especially John Billovits, Kearstin Dischinger, and AnMarie Rodgers, for all the long hours

over many years they put in on behalf of this plan.

A critical objective of the plan is to allow new and much needed housing while not being further overwhelmed by traffic or housing that is available only to the wealthy. With the adoption of the Market and Octavia Plan, we have the tools to achieve those goals.

Allowing housing with reduced parking is critical to meeting the objectives of the plan. The Market and Octavia Plan, keeping with the spirit of diversity and affordability, recognizes that parking increases housing costs. Parking can add anywhere from \$50,000 to upwards of \$150,000 to a single housing unit. These costs are passed on to buyers and tenants. Our neighborhood supported reduced parking allowances because we recognized that it

Nowhere was this feeling of community more noticeable than at last month's 10th annual Lily Street Sale. While I have never actively participated in the sale, it is such a joy to wander up and down the street, see the neighbors, check out the sales and drop in on the barbecue. It was (another) beautiful day and everyone was so cheerful and the party feeling seemed more important than the selling of items. As the sale came to an end, the folks in the 300 block stayed on, filling up the street and just enjoying each other's company. And we raised \$450 for the John Muir PTA!

On the other hand, at the Public Safety Committee meeting this month, I saw another demonstration of community. A 14-year resident from Fell Street came to tell us about a burglary that happened to her recently. She felt compelled to not only come to the meeting to talk about it, but she also notified her neighbors of the occurrence so they could be forewarned. The beat officers from Northern Station, who regularly attend these meetings, went with all of us after the meeting to examine the site and talk to the immediate neighbor on Hickory Street to see what could be done about discouraging any other entries from that side. The Public Safety Committee promised to flyer the rest of the neighborhood so that there would be information and warnings about possible burglars in the area. While this was not quite like the happy celebration on Lily Street, it was another demonstration of how neighbors work together in Hayes Valley.

While I am out almost every day in the neighborhood, I am usually striding off to a meeting or errand of some sort. I haven't really done much casual strolling, but I do see people out everywhere. It is so great to live somewhere that is so walkable and where one can feel so at ease. During baseball season, whenever I am dog-sitting for a friend, I usually walk the dog around 11:00pm. Quite often, I would run into one of the ushers on his way home from the ballpark and we would casually walk together for a little way. It was sort of surprising to see him just recently in the early evening on Hayes Street and have him greet me as "Madam President."

Small world - great neighborhood.

Oak and Buchanan, is way more than your corner grocery – it's a post office where packages are delivered for neighbors who work during the day; it's a bank where customers can get a short-term loan or purchase on credit; it's a neighborhood bulletin board (HVNA meeting May 22nd) – but most of all it's Vic Sabbah who has run the market for 38 years and who retires this month.

John Muir PTA - Two Years Later

This spring marks the second year, since a group of community members formed the John Muir PTA. Many of us did not even have children in the neighborhood, but one thing brought us together: the importance of every child getting a quality education. We knew first hand, as active community policing advocates, the connection between little or no education and a life of crime and violence.

As a city we have seen many of our neighborhood schools in the Western Addition closed, and with these closures the loss of important institutions that are part of a healthy community. The John Muir Elementary PTA was formed with this in mind, to build a partnership with teachers, staff, students, families and community members to assure a quality education for every child. Our goal for the past two years has been to partner with the teachers, staff, students and families to "Let the sun shine on John Muir".

Here is a summary of what the PTA, Tzu Chi Foundation, Community Partners United (CPU), Western Addition Beacon Center, CA PUC, SF School Volunteers, HVNA, HV Neighborhood Parks Group and Mo'Magic have been up to in the last year:

- August Back to School Day attended by Mayor Newsom and Supervisor Mirkarimi, SF Police Chief Heather Fong, Daniel Homsey (MONS), HVNA, Lower Haight Neighbors Organization
- October Wells Fargo Volunteer day and Halloween Poster Contest and CAPUC Halloween Haunted House.
- November Community Thanksgiving Celebration hosted by the Western Addition Beacon Center and CPU.
- December Winter Carnival for students, staff and families.
- January 2008 Free family movie night
- March/April Arbor Day/Recycle Event, sponsored by California Dept of Conservation, school officials, PTA, Tzu Chi Foundation and CPU, and kickoff for John Muir recycling program. The children have collected over 9000 bottles & cans since late March. Drop off your clean recyclables at the school office. The school has raised over \$1500 for the classrooms so far; Western Addition Beacon Center offered ESL and computer classes for parents and community

members. Lily Street Block Sale/John Muir PTA fundraiser raised \$450; SF Rebuilding Together volunteers along with Elokin and Nora of HV Neighborhood Parks Group weeded, gave TLC to the learning garden on Webster between Oak & Page, and planted a new native plant garden with plants provided by the Bay Natives Nursery.



Still to happen:

- 2nd Annual John Muir Teacher Appreciation Day on May 22nd, 2008. Join us at the 8:40 am school assembly to give flowers, awards and lunch to our Community Heroes.
- 5th Grade Promotion Ceremony on June 12th at 10 am. Join students, teachers, staff and community members to honor our 5th graders as they move on to middle school.

For next school year, we're working on purchasing new play equipment for the school, expanding arts programs and gardens, and challenging ourselves to meet the fiscal needs of public education.

We have accomplished a lot at John Muir, much of it due to community members, Tzu Chi Foundation, Steve Shululu of SF School Volunteers, CA PUC, Elizabeth Cleere (Student Volunteer Coordinator) of International High School and many others. We're always looking for new PTA members and volunteers. If you are interested, contact Gail Baugh, PTA president, 626-6120 or g.baugh@sbcglobal.net. We especially want to invite neighborhood parents, who have children ages 5 to 10, to take the time to check us out and stop by enroll your child (if not already enrolled) and become an active volunteer to help students to achieve their highest potential.

Moroccan Festival!

The Hayes Valley Merchants are having a "Two Day" Moroccan Festival Block party, Saturday June 14th, 11 am–9 pm and Sunday June 15th 12 noon–5pm. They will have a Moroccan tent set up all weekend in the vacant lot at Octavia and Linden Streets as well as a tent each day in Patricia's Green, where there will be a Moroccan tea festival. The event will include lots of entertainers, drum corps from African Outlet, fortune tellers, a henna artist, and more.

Save the Date and Come Celebrate!

Neighborhood Baptist Church, in collaboration with Community Partners United, will host a Community Block Party on Saturday August 16, 2008 from 11 am to 2 pm on Buchanan Street between Hayes and Grove Streets. The street will be closed, and the event will include Free Food, Entertainment, Voter Registration, Health Screenings, Children's Activities, Community Resources and much more. Upcoming Meetings:

Our May meeting will feature a presentation by the League of Women Voters on June 2008 ballot measures. With the contention about Propositions 98 and 99, the possible effect on rent control, restrictions on public programs and eminent domain, we should all be well informed before casting our ballots.

The June meeting will focus on the proposed rebuilding of Hayes Valley Playground in a public private partnership. See details elsewhere in the Voice. We will also consider a proposal from the French American International School to convert the former Harley Davidson dealership on Page Street to an educational venue.

Tentative plans for July call for a review of the Living Street conversion of Linden Street, which is scheduled to be complete by that time. Perhaps we'll be able to have at least a portion of our meeting there!

Hayes Valley Playground Needs Your Help

e have a urgent opportunity *right now* to make sure Hayes Valley
Playground gets the attention it
needs. As many of you may know, our own
Hayes Valley Playground, at Hayes and
Buchanan Streets, is in need of serious repair
and reconstruction. The park is very important
to our neighborhood: the clubhouse provides
many after school programs, the children's
playground is one of the few in the area and
the basketball and tennis courts are well used.

The Trust for Public Land (TPL), a well-known non-profit organization, has come to two of our General Meetings and talked to us about raising funds to improve Hayes Valley Playground as one of three parks in San Francisco for their "Parks for People" program. The "Parks for People" program raises private, non-profit and public funds to renovate parks in important areas, like our neighborhood. The other two parks in the program are Boeddeker Park and Balboa Park, both very deserving parks in their own communities. In order to meet the programs funding goal of \$8 million for the three parks, we need to make sure the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors help meet the goal through the city's budget process.

TPL has already raised \$4 Million in private dollars, but they need \$4 Million more. The Recreation and Parks Department made a request for \$1.5 million in next year's budget for funds for repairs at Hayes Valley Playground, but, as we know, this budget year is very difficult for the city and all requests will not be honored. For that reason is it imperative that we speak out and let the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors know how important the city's budget is to rebuilding our park!

Please email the Mayor's office at gavin. newsom@sfgov.org before May 30th and tell him why he needs to fund Hayes Valley Playground. Good things to include in your email are:

- How important the park and improving it is to your, your family and the neighborhood
- This funding will bring in other private funds from the Trust for Public Land and fix two other parks
- This improvement has the support of HVNA, our Supervisor, and the Recreation and Parks department

You can also ensure that the Board of Supervisors is aware of your support by

copying them on any emails or letters you write, or by attending the budget hearing affecting Rec and Park. The Recreation and Park Department's Budget will be heard by the Board of Supervisors Budget and Finance Committee on Monday, June 16th in the Board Chamber, Room 250, beginning at 11:00am

The HVNA Board and others are exited about this possible funding to rebuild our playground. TPL has worked very well with communities to find out what we need and want for our parks. The first community meeting to talk about what we all want for Hayes Valley Playground is: Saturday, June 28th. From 12-3 pm at the playground. Please come so that we can all be involved in making this renovation what we all want it to be!

brought more affordability and less traffic. It also helped maintain the character of the neighborhood, where currently up to 50 percent of households are car-free.

But reducing parking is not enough. Through a protracted negotiation process, HVNA worked with Supervisor Mirkarimi to ensure that the plan had implementation tools and finances to provide additional affordable housing and community benefits. Through the plan's development impact fees, we'll see stable financing for affordable housing in and around the plan area. We'll also see funds for landscaping, traffic calming, and community centers. In a nutshell, not only is this a plan, but it is also a conduit for real physical improvements to the neighborhood.

Residents of Hayes Valley should be proud that we are on the cutting edge of sustainable and equitable urbanism. With the escalation of gasoline prices, increasing concern over sprawl and global warming, and the desire for walkable neighborhoods, Hayes Valley is poised to be the target of substantial development pressure. Without this plan, the development would come but with few benefits. With this plan, our neighborhood will remain a diverse and attractive community while enabling diverse incomes.






