Affordable Housing on "Parcel G"

n July 15th the Redevelopment
Commission is scheduled to hold a
hearing on the proposed affordable
housing development at the SE corner of
Fulton and Gough. Known as "Parcel G," the lot
is one of 22 parcels formerly occupied by the
Central Freeway. We urge HVNA members to
attend that meeting and show their support for
the project.

HVNA and its Transportation & Planning Committee have reviewed this proposal numerous times and we unanimously support the plan. The plan includes 120 units of housing and on-site support services for formerly homeless individuals. It is organized around an open interior courtyard with ground floor retail spaces facing Fulton and Gough Streets.

No parking is slated for the development. This keeps construction costs down and the project affordable. The project is adjacent to the Performing Arts garage, so visitors who drive to the site will have plenty of nearby parking.

The developers are Community Housing Partnership, which specializes in supportive housing, and Mercy Housing, which has produced and managed many successful affordable housing projects. The architect is David Baker, who is an award-winning architect recognized for his excellence in design for both affordable and market rate housing. The design is architecturally attractive and interesting, it would enliven streets and preserve views of the existing mural.

The plan is consistent with HVNA's goal of ensuring affordable housing for all. Recall that as part of the deal to fund construction of Octavia Boulevard and Patricia's Green, the remaining freeway parcels were to be sold for

Hayes Valley Playground Renovation Workshop

■ Saturday afternoon, June 28th there were no computer classes, no cooking classes, no games with Josh, the Recreation Director in the Hayes Valley Playground Clubhouse – instead approximately two dozen community members, young and old, came to the first of three public workshops to be held this summer to provide ideas and talk about what we need in the upcoming renovation of Hayes Valley Playground.

Neighbors told the Trust for Public Land's design team that they were hoping for a park which would enliven the area and be more welcoming. Many residents expressed frustration about the appearance and features of the clubhouse and the playground, and the need to add landscaping and energy-efficient features to the park. Suggested renovations included a new playground, barbeque and picnic area and new clubhouse.

This summer will be an exciting time for the future of Hayes Valley Playground. The next meeting will provide some options for the community to discuss about the planned renovation based on input the team has received so far. Please come to the next two meetings and remind your neighbors to come. Meetings are scheduled July 17th and August 14th from 7–9pm. Refreshments are provided at each meeting.

shouldn't all be more helpful to both him and Paul. I have started out badly this month with not getting my editorial in very quickly, but I do want to ask more people out there if they could volunteer to pick up a delivery route. I am not terribly young, but it only takes me one hour a month to do my route and most of the routes are not quite as big. It is a great way to get out in the neighborhood, see different places and people and do something for HVNA. Just drop any one of us an e-mail message or phone call or stop us on the street, if you would like to help.

The most rewarding thing I did this past month was attend the kickoff for Mo'Magic's summer reading program. Statistics show that children who do not participate in reading and mathematics programs over the summer begin the next school year behind in these skills, so this is a very important new program for Western Addition children. The organizers were expecting 125-150 kids and 200 showed up. It was really exciting to see the energy and enthusiasm of the kids who read for the group. For those not brave enough to read in front of the crowd, there were hula hoops contests while singing the alphabet song. The beat officers from Northern Station SFPD even helped with reading and attempting to hula hoop. Each of the grade levels will read four or five books over the summer and the kids will get to keep the books they read. Contact Sheryl Davis (sheryl.davis@sfgov.org) if you too would like to help with the reading program.

I recently ran into a neighbor who asked about the progress on getting Hayes Street returned to two-way. I wasn't able to tell him much. At the last Pedestrian Safety Action Committee meeting, the SFMTA reiterated the belief that this change would be expensive and even unsafe. We reminded them that the one-way change was to have been temporary while Octavia Boulevard was under construction. There is apparently some discussion to at least reinstate the crosswalk so that there will be better pedestrian flow on Hayes Street. I believe this change is in the works. Check in with our Transportation and Planning committee for more info.

Our next general meeting is July 24th and I hope to see more of you there. We will be previewing the next art project for Patricia's Green along with other community business.

HV Artists Create Wedding Cake



hat's a wedding without CAKE?
Newlyweds of any race, creed, color, or sexual orientation can tie the knot atop a life-size mosaic wedding cake. This conceptual sculpture, conceived by Santiago Rodriguez, is a tribute to love, equality, and San Francisco Mayor Newsom's precedent-setting work toward legalizing same-sex marriage.

The Wedding Cake is currently at the Hayes Valley Market artist's space, with the hope that it will eventually be located at City Hall. It is available for photo opportunities at no charge to the public. Couples are invited to stand on top of the two-tier cake, which is made of white Carrera marble and Italian tile, to complete the artwork concept and honor the myriad of unions brought together through love and commitment. This unique art piece may also be used as a bench for sitting.

Mr. Rodriguez says: "I wanted to do something to thank Mayor Newsom for his efforts. I hope that perhaps he and his new bride will do me the honor of standing on top of the cake for their upcoming wedding photos." He and his group hope the Wedding Cake will become a permanent installation at City Hall and would like to gift the work to the city.

Santiago Rodriquez, owner of Frjtz, the popular Belgian fries and crepe restaurants, is also an Italian-trained mosaic artist. He originally conceived the project after seeing a "conversation bench" in Merida, Mexico. With the recent California Supreme Court ruling, the vision became a wedding cake that also serves as a bench, spurring curiosity and lightheartedness. He put together a dream-team of professional artists who donated their talents to the design and execution of the frosty confection. The team is Madeline Behrens-Brigham, mixed-media artist, community liaison and co-founder of the Hayes Valley Arts Coalition who was honored as this year's District 5 Woman of the Year: Lillian Sizemore. mosaic historian, author of Guide to Mosaic Sites: San Francisco and instructor at Getty Museum in LA; and Laurel True, Founder and Director of Institute of Mosaic Art, who has completed dozens of mosaic installations in the US and abroad. All three women are instructors at Institute of Mosaic Art in Oakland.

Current plans call for a champagne and cake reception from 5–9 pm on Friday, July 18th at the 580 Hayes Gallery. In the meantime, the cake remains on display along with the current presentation on the history of the building and the area. Patricia's Green Temporary Art Installations to Continue

■ The hard work of the Hayes Valley Art
Coalition, the HVNA ACE committee and the
Public Arts Program of the SF Arts
Commission is poised to bring another
powerful work of art to Patricia's Green this
fall. The ACE committee and HVNA Board of
Directors is working with the Arts Coalition
and the City to facilitate approval, and there

will be a presentation of the proposed artwork at this month's HVNA meeting on July 24th.

As conceived, the sculpture will be painted steel, approximately ten feet in diameter and two feet wide. Plans are to have it installed for a duration of six months, hopefully starting prior to the November election. This is the 50th anniversary of the creation of the peace sign as a graphic symbol during the days of concern about nuclear fall out or attacks in the 1950s. It seems to have particular significance given the current state of affairs.

Creator Tony Labat is a highly regarded SF artist who is on the faculty of the San Francisco Art Institute. His art has received many awards and grants, including two from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Hayes Valley Art Coalition has been working hard to ensure that temporary art installations on the Green continue uninterrupted, and has plans for future art works to make this goal a reality.

Slow...and Easy

oday is July 1, 2008, and the ground at Civic Center Plaza has just begun to be tilled for an amazing event that is coming to San Francisco. A Victory Garden will grow there where, over 60 years ago, a WWII Victory garden also grew. Around that garden for five days later this summer, a Farmers Market and food bazaar will focus on locally produced healthy food. Slow Food Nation 2008 is a "showcase of sustainable food...the first-ever American collaborative gathering to unite the growing sustainable food movement and introduce thousands of people to food that is good, clean and fair." Around the corner at Herbst Theater, the organizers will sponsor a speaker series which will culminate with a panel discussion featuring author Michael Pollan (the Omnivore's Dilemma), author and cultural critic Wendell Berry, Alice Waters (Chez Panisse), author and journalist Eric Schlosser, and founder of the Slow Food movement Carlo Petrini. These are the power hitters of healthy eating.

Choosing to eat local, sustainable and organic foods is an act of environmental stewardship. Besides being healthier for ourselves and our families, we move towards a reduction in pesticides and herbicides released in our environment, reduced carbon emissions by minimizing transportation distances, and promoting small family-owned farms over large agribusiness practices.

The HVNA ACE page in this issue focuses on organic and natural food resources in and around Hayes Valley. The reality is that there are now very few food stores in the



neighborhood. With all the building planned in Hayes Valley, we should persuade developers to encourage natural grocers as tenants. We are very fortunate to have the twice weekly Heart of the City Farmers Market at UN Plaza. Also two local organizations, Modern Cooks at Modern Tea and Hayes Valley Neighborhood Parks Group, work with children to promote healthy school gardening and food production skills. Home organic gardening is also being promoted by non-profits and the City's Victory Garden project www.sfvictorygardens.org.

Slow Food Nation 2008 (slowfoodnation.org) promises to be a sensorial treat in our extended neighborhood. It will be five days of exploring possibilities for the future by experimenting in the now. Experimenting slowly and incorporating changes gradually makes it easy... Slow and easy. Buen Provecho!

housing development with 50 percent of that housing affordable. Seven of the parcels were sold to the Redevelopment Agency for construction of affordable housing.

This will be one of the first projects built on the former freeway parcels and will set a standard of architectural excellence. It will also be one of the first projects to be built under the new Market/Octavia Plan, which is intended to foster a diverse, walkable neighborhood that is less automobile dependent. And it will serve an extremely needy population with much needed housing and support services.

As good as this all is, the project is not a done deal and needs our support. Some adjacent property owners have raised concerns about the project and slowed the approval process. They object to having formally homeless individuals living nearby, and are demanding that the project provide an expensive garage even though studies show that people who will live there do not own automobiles and there is a public garage adjacent to the project. They also object to the density, which is comparable to existing neighborhood densities, even though crucial support services wouldn't be feasible with fewer than the proposed 120 units.

HVNA is proud to support this project and is committed to solving the citywide problem of homelessness by providing real concrete solutions – i.e. housing. Please come out and speak in favor of the Parcel G project **July 15, 4PM, City Hall room 416**. Redevelopment Agency agendas are not finalized until the Friday before the hearing. 
