

Greening Octavia Boulevard Parcels

At a recent meeting, I proposed the idea of using the freeway parcels along Octavia for victory gardens until developers are ready to begin building. This was in response to concerns that many projects may be delayed for several years due to the financial crisis' impact on new construction financing. Here is our progress report:

The Mayor's Office of Economic Development, who controls the properties, is very supportive of the concept, especially for parcels M (Fell-Hickory), N (Hickory-Oak),V (Market-Haight) and possibly O and P on the west side of Octavia. They have an interesting concept for temporary retail use on K and L (Hayes to Fell).

We are looking for a financial sponsor, working out details on insurance and establishing guidelines to make it clear to users that these are temporary uses only until development is ready to proceed. We are also trying to use one of the parcels for a dog run to take some pressure off Patricia's Green. More details will be presented at the July meeting. If you are interested in helping, sign up with Jim Warshell at the next

Safety through Community Building

Safety for me brings to mind a beat officer preventing a crime, a NERT member rescuing me in an emergency, Josh feeding a hungry child, Ms Aubrey's kindergarten art works, Barbara Wenger's Peace Wall project and Mo' Magic's Summer Reading Program all working together as community partners to foster a safe and caring community. This is not a vision to me - but a reality - it is part of my daily routine, for I wear many hats in my neighborhood and have for quite some time. My long time involvement, almost 20 years in many groups, has given me a unique insight into the many reasons why our community has been so resilient. Our community has been very fortunate to have a core group of individuals working together as partners over many years to develop a community policing model that is driven by community building

Hayes Valley as a neighborhood has a long history of community building. We have gone from a neighborhood that was overcome by crime and violence to one that shares with other neighborhoods our insight into community policing. I, along with others, was recruited and mentored in the basics of Community Policing. The essence of our success is that the model has been both designed and driven from the ground up. We created our vision of a safe and caring community and this vision has been realized due to our willingness to partner and collaborate with others. Our vision of safety is broad in nature as we not only look to stop crime but to look at the root causes and work as a community to find permanent solutions for them.

In keeping with our commitment to facilitate discussion of important issues that impact our community, Hayes Valley Neighborhood Association invites you to an evening discussion about public safety on Thursday, May 28th. We have invited City leaders, department heads, police, NERT, Mo'Magic and other partners who collaborate with us in moving from reactive to proactive solutions.

Happenings at John Muir Elementary School

There are so many great things happening at John Muir, our local school, that there isn't room for it all in the Voice. We have included some information here, and more is available on the John Muir link on our website.

Lily Street dead ends at the John Muir schoolyard wall, but the neighborhood doesn't see that as a barrier to our involvement in this institution. On the last Saturday of April each year, the Lily Street residents have a blocks long yard sale. For several years, they have included community awareness and fundraising for John Muir as part of the event. This year was the most successful to date, with resource tables in the schoolyard; the SFPD running the BBQ and helping local kids serve lunch to participants; a sale of handmade cards from the children's art project; and donations to John Muir PTA of over \$550! Plan ahead for next year's sale...

The San Francisco Giants are looking to extend their involvement in the community, and John Muir is one of two San Francisco schools that will be receiving \$100 for every run the Giants score this season! Too often we look at sports through a lens of wins and losses. This generous act allows us to look at our local baseball team in a different way. It also gives teachers another "hook" to use to get kids excited about the subject matter. Besides the obvious math implications, there are also history, geography, physics and other lesson plans that can be tied to this program. Season ticket holder, HVNA President, and John Muir PTA Treasurer Frances Neagley now has even more of an excuse to wear the orange and black...

The dedicated teachers at John Muir work with a group of wonderful students, who continue to excel in all of their studies. For several years, HVNA, the state PUC and Community Partners United have sponsored a Halloween poster contest, with the art hanging in PUC offices and in local businesses and homes. Now, some of the talented artists at John Muir will have recent art works hang at the de Young Museum! Some people may hit the museum to see King Tut, but don't miss our kids' treasures while you're there...

Hayes Valley Merchants are all unique, individual shops/ restaurants / businesses, each following their Passion !!! They will show this off at this party.





Tending Patricia's Green (and beyond)

I moved to Hayes Valley a year ago and created the role of coordinator for volunteer garden days in Patricia's Green. Honestly, I can't think of a better way for me to jump into the fabric of the neighborhood and make friends fast. Last month, on April 26, twenty-three of us joined in the biggest and most thorough scrubbing of Patricia's Green ever. While not everyone had green thumbs, five teams of weed pullers, shrub pruners, pavement washers, graffiti removers and gardeners came together in the spirit of community and dirty hands. SF Rec and Park staff gardener, Todd Sucy, graciously coordinated our work on his regular day off, as City staff could never do what we accomplished with current staffing levels.

Our recent late rain came as a blessing. Both Patricia's Green and nearby Koshland Park (an urban dream at Buchanan and Page) are now in full spring glory. If you haven't gotten out for a stroll in our parks, you're missing out! Please be aware that the planters are off limits! Children and dogs enjoy exploring them, but can be very harmful.

Unfortunately, all isn't so pretty with the graffiti in the neighborhood and charming Linden Street a hot spot. Even the the Peace sculpture was targeted over a recent night, but cleaned up the next day by Bicycle Bob's Graffiti Watch team.

Graffiti Watch volunteers have helped mitigate graffiti on public property around the Green

since this past fall. Last month, Bob attended the City's Graffiti summit with over 200 interested citizens to learn how they can help stem the spread of such vandalism. The City makes it possible for community members to get involved by providing training, tools, paint and support to take back your sidewalk, block and neighborhood. I'm a regular graffiti cleaner, and I tell you there is no better way to get to know your neighbor. Thanks go out to Keishu (aka David) Resident Manager of Bridge Housing at 333 Fell Street for providing a permanent home to our local Graffiti Watch team's supplies.

Now with Patricia's Green looking good I've make a commitment to tend to the sidewalk planters on the East side of Octavia between Hayes and Oak. While the boulevard leading to Patricia's Green may not quite be the Avenue des Champs-Elysées, it's got potential to be a fine street. It needs your help as much as Patricia's Green. Anyone willing to join me with a Greening movement down to Market Street?

Garden Days on Patricia's Green will be Saturdays May 23 and July 18. Koshland Park days are normally the 2nd Saturday each month. Your neighbors are waiting to meet you.





Volunteer Symposium

On May 19th a Volunteer Symposium was held at Le Colonial in San Francisco. This event was sponsored by Citizen Hope, the New Leaders Council, Democrats Work, the Good OL' Girls, and chaired by the San Francisco Young Democrats (SFYD). Hayes Valley and the Western Addition were well represented by 3 groups among the 10 spaces available at the symposium. Mo Magic Foundation, The Koshland Garden, and Opportunity Impact had tables for volunteers to come up to and offer help. Other groups included San Francisco Food Bank, St Anthony's Foundation, San Francisco Boys and Girls Clubs, and Stern Grove Festival association. Proceeds from the event went to the Food Bank.

Supervisor Bevan Dufty had Maxwell Szabo of the SFYD get in touch with Hayes Valley volunteer Bob Barnwell, representing the Castro Lions. Since the Castro Lions are a membership organization, Barnwell gave Maxwell the names of local groups who need volunteer help. The Western Addition and Hayes Valley have a number of groups that need volunteer help, and many were contacted. This was the first opportunity to work with groups such as the SFYD. We hope HVNA can be partners with SFYD on future projects and events.
