The Sweetest Block in Hayes Valley

Truffles at Miette

We all love our small businesses in Hayes Valley. There are a lot of unique stores in our area that carry many different lines of products. There is a spot that might be the sweetest area in our neighborhood. In just one block we have three very different sweet stores. In the block of Hayes between Gough and Octavia these three stores carry distinct lines of sweet products. Each store also has a second-

ary line that is worth the stop especially during the upcoming holiday season.

If you walk this block your first stop may be at the corner of Hayes and Gough. Christopher Elbow Artisanal Chocolate is at 401 Hayes St.. His only other store is in Kansas City, Mo. Each day these hand made chocolates are flown in from the kitchen in Missouri. Each day there are 24 to 30 types of chocolates to choose from. Some chocolates are seasonal and on October 29 Michael, the manager, was helping

29 Michael, the manager, was helping Christopher Elbow with the fall flavors. If you want the chocolate taste but not the candy then try the 10 to 15 types of hot chocolate. After 1½ years in Hayes Valley Christopher Elbow Artisanal Chocolate is doing well and looking forward to the holiday season. Stop by and get your box of holiday sweets.

Your next stop could be a few doors up at Paulette Macaron at 437A Hayes. There are 11 to 15 types of macarons to choose from.

The other location is in Beverly Hills. Hayes Valley and Beverly Hills is a good duo. These traditional French cookies are made by hand and all have natural flavors and colors. This store has been in business for 10 months and also carries a line of coffee and teas. They specialize in the hard to find Mariage Freres tea. This tea has been around since 1854 and comes in many flavors. The holidays

should be good for Paulette Macaron especially as party favors for the fun times over the next few months.

Miette Confiserie at
449 Octavia is another
good stop on this
sweet block. They
carry the widest
range of sweet
products. Chocolates from around
the world plus locally
hand made Artisanal
chocolates fill the store
along with 30 types of
licorice and lots of gum and
rock candy. For almost three
years Tess, the manager, has sold

a large quantity of fluer de sel caramels. If you do not want any of the candy then try the cookies, macarons, or cupcakes that are baked right at the store. The other two locations at the Marina and Ferry Building will soon be joined by a store at Jack London Square. Halloween is a big time of the year for this store as well as the holidays and Valentine's Day.

One block with three very sweet stores all are in the Hayes Valley.

Songs Without Words, an antique piano showroom, opens in Hayes Valley in December taking over the former Linc Art Gallery storefront at Rose and Market. The store offers the finest European pianos in completely restored condition. The store will host recitals and is available for intimate private parties with catering and music. Songs Without Words is also excited to sponsor Hayes Valley's musical and art community with pianos, musicians and video art. Their video projection art and old world furnishings combine to create a truly unique experience in their showroom. 



Performing Arts Building Proposed in Hayes Valley

SFJAZZ is a local nonprofit performing arts organization involved in hosting jazz performances and jazz education. A summary of their mission and goals can be found on their website at: www.sfjazz.org/about/index. asp. They've purchased a parcel in Hayes Valley and are proposing to build a new 3-story building for a performance space and offices. The parcel is located on the northwest corner of Fell and Franklin Streets. There's currently an automotive repair and maintenance business on the site and the buildings that are there now will be replaced. SFJAZZ will build a new state-of-the art jazz performance space, and the building will include offices for about 30-employees, education and rehearsal space, a box office, a small café, and an enclosed loading area on the west side of the property.

The site is an excellent location. It is near the other performing-arts venues in the Civic Center Area, is easily accessible by Muni and BART, and is also relatively easy to access by bicycle. It is just one block from the Hayes Street retail corridor and in walking distance to many fine restaurants. The excellent transitoriented location and the close proximity of

the Performance Arts Garage means this project is not required to have parking. The waiving of the requirement to provide parking is beneficial to SFJAZZ because it makes the project more affordable. It lowers the cost of the development as a whole, making the non-profit more capable of undertaking this project. The project will have ample bicycle parking for employees and visitors.

HVNA has not received final drawings for the project but we have this general description: The main entrance for the new building will be on the corner of Fell and Franklin. The café/ restaurant will likely be on the corner of Linden Alley and Franklin, and will be oriented towards the street to enliven the area. The façade of the building will be glass-wrapped on three sides, but there will be a major blank wall on part of the Linden Street side of the building and on the western side of the building where the loading area will be located. The blank wall is an unfortunate side-effect of the configuration of the theater. The HVNA Transportation and Planning (T & P) committee will be working with the developer to mitigate the visual impact of these walls.

This project largely fits with the spirit and intent of the Market and Octavia Plan, and the T & P committee looks forward to hearing more about the project over the next year. The project sponsor is currently working on the architecture of the building. They expect to be ready for a formal presentation to the community in early 2010 and they hope to go before the Planning Commission in Spring 2010.

One disappointing aspect of the current proposal is the lack of housing on the site. HVNA has always advocated for housing in this area, especially for affordable housing. We recognize a need for housing for performers and musicians and other artists that could live within walking distance to work if they could live in the neighborhood. We'd hoped that this project could include housing for musicians and others. SFJAZZ said that they looked into housing but that the addition of housing made the project too expensive for the non-profit. The HVNA T & P committee will continue to advocate for more affordable housing in the neighborhood and seek ways to keep SFJAZZ involved in that endeavor.


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

Transportation and Planning Committee Report

At 2001 Market, the Prado Group has proposed a mixed-use retail and residential development on the previous site of the S & C Ford dealership at Market and Dolores Streets. While this site is just outside the boundaries of HVNA, it will affect our neighborhood and the broader Market and Octavia Plan, so the T & P Committee is watching it closely.

The Prado Group, along with a representative from Whole Foods, presented the latest iteration of their proposal at the HVNA general meeting on October 22, 2009. The proposal includes a Whole Foods grocery store on the ground floor and 6-stories of housing, totaling 80 units. The proposed project would raze all of the existing buildings on the site and should go to the Planning Commission for approval by January 2010. However several major issues remain unresolved.

First, this development is in a transit rich area of the city and will include a neighborhood-serving grocery store. There are 88,000 people within a one-mile radius of the store and many people will be walking and bicycling to this store. Some HVNA members have expressed disappointment that the grocery store will have 65 parking spaces given the great location for

a model sustainable store. Whole Foods has stores in New York with no parking. We encourage Whole Foods and Prado to think about being cutting-edge and progressive on the retail parking. They could provide an innovative jitney or taxi service for costumers who walk to the store but need a ride home.

Second, HVNA is opposed to Prado's request for a "conditional use" permit from the city in order to increase the parking in the residential component of the development. Again, this is a transit-rich, walkable area, and excessive parking is not needed. Prado is not offering any convincing arguments except that it will enable them to sell their units at a higher price. This is not within the spirit and intent of the Market and Octavia Plan. We are insisting that the developer comply with the allowed parking under the M&O plan.

Lastly, affordable housing remains a concern. Many HVNA members would like to see the affordable housing on site, rather than have the developer pay fees that allow the housing to be built elsewhere. We continue to encourage on-site affordable housing so people of diverse incomes can still live in the Upper Market area.

This is an extremely important development and it will be a project that sets precedence for other mixed-use developments in the Market & Octavia Plan area. HVNA applauds the re-use of the site, the provision of housing and the use of the ground floor as a grocery store; but this is a transit rich site and needs to be built that way. HVNA has not yet taken an official position on this project. More details about this project can be found at: http://www.2001marketsf.com

At 1 Franklin, there will be 35 housing units (15% of them affordable) and a small corner commercial space on the ground floor. The proposed building is located at the corner of Franklin and Page Streets, where there is currently a surface parking lot. 1 Franklin complies with the Market and Octavia Plan in almost every way. The HVNA T &P Committee has met several times with the project sponsors and while we still have reservations about some of the architecture, we are very enthusiastic about the project. The Hayes Valley neighborhood worked on the implementation of the Market & Octavia Plan for eight years and we appreciate this developer for adhering to its guidelines. It is expected that this project will appear before the planning commission within a year.
